College to offer marijuana classes starting Fall 2018

SPRINGFIELD – Mark your calendar, Loggers!

Lincoln Land Community College announced the opening of its first marijuana course this fall 2018. To raise awareness for this class, LLCC will be providing coffee and pot brownies from 8 am to 2 pm on Tuesday, April 3, in the A.Lincoln Commons.

Students must be 21 years old and must show a valid ID to get brownies. Those under the age of 21 are welcome to coffee.

A new LLCC Professor, Mark Diesel, will be teaching the marijuana class and invites anyone who is inquiring about the course to join him at the Wake and Bake.

The course will include the learning of each strain and its background, how to properly grow and maintain marijuana plants and the business aspect of marijuana dispensaries. The purpose of this course is to help students pursue their careers in the marijuana industry.

Any student who is interested enrolling for the marijuana class must



Any student who is interested enrolling for the marijuana class must be 21 years of age and must maintain a grade point average of a 3.0.

Students will have to go through a background check before enrolling in the course to ensure there is

no criminal background.

Unfortunately, students with a history of crime will not be able to enroll in this course.

LLCC will start building the “Mary Jane” workshop during the summer and will be located next to the Greenhouse.

The building will be installed with tinted windows and will include a laboratory room, a garden for the marijuana plants, an office for Diesel and an outdoor seating area. Diesel and the LLCC police are the only ones who will have access to the Mary Jane Building.

The marijuana grown in class will not be for sale. However, students who have a designated driver and maintain a ‘B’ average in all of their classes will be able to smoke the strains in the outdoor area every Friday afternoon.

AR-15 found guilty in monumental case

Gun Court Hearing:

Since Guns kill people, not people with guns killing people, a gun responsible in multiple shootings was found guilty.

On March, 20. That gun, AR-15, or his nickname, Arthur, was found guilty. He committed homicide, broke multiple laws and regulations, and had some questionable issues on why he was legal in the US to be purchased.

His defense attorney, an old Flintlock pistol named Jefferson Thomas was hard at work defending him.

"If we don't stick up for the second amendment, who will? Just because he fits the description of the gun who was used in the incident, does that make him guilty? If you ask me, I feel that is a stereotype with a 'gun racist' point of view to accuse Arthur like this" Thomas said in his opening statement.

Members of the court, could hear the rally and protests yelling at Jefferson Thomas over his statement.



the armed police settled the riots with a peaceful talks.

The prosecuting attorney, a knife named Rusty Kitchen Master was in utter shock at Thomas' opening statement. "Objection your honor" said Master. "If we allow his 'gun racist' remarks in here, you as the judges may have clouded judgment on the ruling of Arthur. And that to me stands in the way of my agenda... I mean the justice that needs to be sentenced here."

"Overruled" said Supreme Court Judge John Roberts. "I would like to see where this is going."

After this, Defense at-

torney Thomas was stating "How can a gun kill people if a person is not controlling the firearm? The answer is it can't."

Rusty, asked for a demonstration of the act in the courtroom. Since Arthur had his trigger safety pinned or handcuffed, he couldn't have his trigger pulled. Thankfully, he didn't have a clip in either, which is indecent for a gun (considered to be nude in gun culture), he at least wasn't loaded.

Jefferson and the judges agreed to allow Arthur to try and re-enact the events. He was unable to move, unable to fire, and unable

to load a clip into his mag slot. "I can't" said Arthur.

Was it because he was so nervous in the court, or was he was paralyzed with fear? That's what Master had made his case to be.

"As you can see your honor, he is clearly guilty because he can't re-enact the horrendous events he carried out" said Master. "Since the clip can fit, he must not acquit" Master's famous anti-gun slogan has now become a social media protest slogan.

Shortly after this: Arthur was found guilty on all accounts of his shootings.

Many activist find themselves thinking, if only

there were preventable measures like gun laws for guns, gun schools for guns, background checks on the gun. Why was this gun allowed to be owned?

The person responsible for owning the gun was allowed to walk free after he was held hostage by Arthur. Arthur had used the human to load himself and pull his trigger.

Thankfully, the main culprit responsible for mass shootings was apprehended and dealt justice, while the poor hostage who had to shoot Arthur was able to cope with what had happened.

Many still find themselves asking, why did the Founding guns allows humans to be in the second amendment anyway? Was it for human arms rights, or to allow guns to liberate themselves from the gun government?

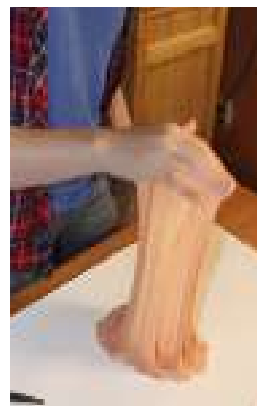
Some other students don't see what all the hype is about Slime 101 being taught at LLCC. Student Alec Tricity said

The AI Revolution has already begun and you don't even know it. Who's the fool? Not your calculator.

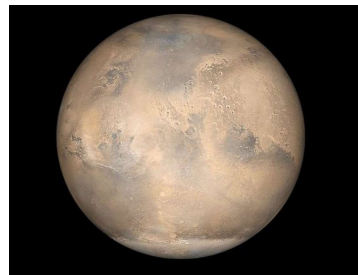
